

FINE OF \$1,000 SETS HIGH MARK

Parry Sound Woman Is Heavily Taxed For Foreign Exchange Breach

Windsor, Ont., March 31.—(CP) —Mrs. Elizabeth J. Parton, 42, wife of a wealthy Parry Sound merchant, yesterday was fined \$1,000, including costs, or six months, on two charges of violations of the foreign exchange control board regulations when she pleaded guilty before Magistrate D. M. Brodie.

Mrs. Parton, who on February 14 tried to smuggle \$1,080 pinned to her slip across the river to Detroit in order to visit her dying son in Virginia, was unable to attend court because of illness, the magistrate was told.

She was fined \$500 or three months on each charge. The fines were paid.

Fines Are Paid

The charges were "that she did, on February 14, attempt to deceive a customs officer and inspector of the foreign exchange control board by not declaring \$1,080 in Canadian currency.

"That she did on that date attempt to export \$1,080 without possessing a license issued by the foreign exchange control board."

The board was represented by John B. Aylesworth, as special crown prosecutor.

The fines were the largest imposed on an individual this year, W. M. Morphet, board manager, said to-day. The amounts were asked by Mr. Aylesworth, and were paid from the \$1,000 which the board seized when Mrs. Parton was turned over to them by customs officials.

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
